Rules for British Vaulting Events 2023

Effective 1st January 2023

Introduction

BEV is a company limited by guarantee. Copies of the Memorandum and Articles of Association and By Laws are available on application to the BEV Chairman or from Companies House.

These Rules are the 16th Edition, effective January 1st 2023. All previous editions are superseded and are null and void.

The Rules will be updated annually, and it is the responsibility of BEV Members to be familiar with current Rules and updates.

The Management Committee reserves the right to make, remove or amend the Rules at any time by Committee decision and will notify Members in writing of any changes.

The Rules govern all Events.

Every eventuality cannot be provided for in these Rules. In any unforeseen or exceptional circumstances, it is the duty of the Ground Jury to make a decision based on common sense and fair play thus reflecting as closely as possible the intention of the Rules and the rules of the FEI.

All international competitors must be familiar with the FEI Statutes, General Regulations and detailed Rules for FEI vaulting events. These must be read in conjunction with the FEI 'Guidelines' and 'Code of Points' for Compulsory, Free Test and Technical Test exercises. The Rules are intended to standardise the discipline (provide a fair playing field) and to draw attention to and accommodate the special conditions within GB.

The Rules do not exclusively relate to National Competitions and some Rules, particularly with regard to conduct and discipline, will be effective at all times and in any circumstances, with regard to members of BEV, where the sport could be brought into disrepute.

In all matters governing Events, these Rules will take precedence over the FEI Rules.

Code of Conduct

In all equestrian sports the horse must be considered paramount. The well-being of the horse shall be above the demands of breeders, trainers, riders, vaulters, owners, dealers, organisers, sponsors or officials.

All handling and veterinary treatment must ensure the health and welfare of the horse. The highest standards of nutrition, health, sanitation, and safety shall be encouraged and maintained at all times with adequate provision made for ventilation, feeding, watering and maintaining a healthy environment during transportation.

Emphasis should be placed on increasing education in training and equestrian practices and on promoting scientific studies in equine health. In the interests of the horse, the fitness and competence of the vaulter and the lunger shall be regarded as essential.

All riding and training methods must take account of the horse as a living entity and must not include any technique considered by the FEI to be abusive. Adequate controls shall be established to ensure that all persons under the jurisdiction of BEV shall respect the welfare of the horse.

Fair competition, respect, friendship, team spirit, equality, sport without doping, respect for written and unwritten rules such as integrity, solidarity, tolerance, care, excellence and joy, are the key pillars of fair play that can be experienced and learnt as a part of BEV. The Management Committee reserve the right to take action against any person considered in breach of these key pillars.

The national and international rules and regulations in equestrian sport regarding the health and welfare of the horse must be adhered to at all national and international events and also during training.

Competition rules and regulations shall be continually reviewed to ensure such welfare.

CHAPTER I BRITISH VAULTING EVENTS

Article 1 Types of Events

1. British Vaulting Events can be divided into:
 - National Competitions
 - Regional Championships Selection Trials
 - British Championships
 - Official exhibitions and demonstrations
 - Training Days or Camps

Article 2 National Competitions

1. The fee to BEV for all competitions is £1 per vaulter to be submitted by the Competition Organiser within 30 days of the Event.
2. At Competitions being held in GB, the Competition Organiser can insist that competing Clubs provide stewards, helpers and officials on a pro rata basis. Clubs failing to comply may not be allowed to participate.
3. Every Competition must have a Technical Delegate. He or she must be approved by the Management Committee. The Technical Delegate must have no other role within the Competition **at British Championships. At Regional Championships a BEV National judge can act as Technical Delegate, providing that** the judge agrees, is witness to the entire competition and the competition is running one arena only.
4. In the event of any dispute, an Appeals Panel will be convened consisting of any three of the

following: a Judge; the Technical Delegate; the Competition Organiser; a Veterinarian; a member of the Management Committee. The Technical Delegate may appoint a replacement for any member of the Appeals Panel should the need arise. The Appeals Panel will decide what action, if any, is to be taken.

5. Competitions should contain all classes for Squads, Individuals, Pas de Deux and Walk classes, however dispensation may be sought from the Management Committee to omit certain classes should circumstances prevail.
6. Para-vaulting sub sections must be offered in each class. (Competitors eligible for para- vaulting classes are vaulters with a permanent physical or intellectual impairment.)

Article 3 Schedules (see also Article 9)

1. Schedules must be sent to the BEV Competition Secretary not less than eight weeks (but preferably more than eight weeks) prior to the Competition. This is so that schedules can be checked, put on the website and sent to Clubs at least six weeks prior to an Event.
2. All schedules must use the BEV proforma schedule and must state:
 - Venue address and travel directions
 - Closing date for entries.
 - Cost of late entries.
 - Stabling availability and costs.
 - Availability and type of catering.
 - Music – in what format it should be. If required to be sent before the competition, details of when and where it should be sent to.
 - Qualified First Aid cover to be approved by BEV.
 - Date and time for declarations.
 - Any pertinent information (e.g. dogs allowed?)

Article 4 Timetable and Programme

1. Participating groups must be given a timetable and their approximate starting times at the latest six days before the beginning of the competition.
2. It is recommended that a full programme be made available after the close of declarations.
3. When a horse is entering the arena more than once in the same class there should be at least 3 horses or 4 vaulters between each time it enters the arena.

Article 5 Medical Assistance

1. Competitions cannot start until the approved First Aid cover is in place. This cover must remain in place until the Competition finishes.

Article 6 Official Notice Board and Results

1. Official Notice Board must be clearly located and should display:
 - the definitive timetable
 - contact details of Veterinarian
 - name of the approved First Aid cover
 - information about the Organising Committee, Technical Delegate and Judges
2. Competitors' scores for all classes must be posted on the Official Notice Board during the Competition and final results posted as soon as possible before the prize giving. The time of posting must be noted on the score sheet.
3. Score sheets must be available for collection by competitors after the competition prize giving.
4. Competitors will be responsible for their own original score sheets. BEV Competition Secretaries will keep electronic copies only.

Article 7 Appeals, Objections and Complaints

1. Only the owners, the trainers, the lungers or the Club nominated person (Chef d'Equipe) of a horse taking part in a Competition may lodge an objection.
2. Objections must be made to the Event Secretary in writing and accompanied by a deposit of £100 not later than one hour after the happening that gave rise to the objection. In the case of an objection to the qualification of a horse or vaulter, the objection must be made before the start of the class.
3. The decision of the Appeals Panel is final.
4. Unless the objection is upheld the deposit is forfeit.
5. Appeals against scoring errors must be made within an hour of the score sheet being released.

Article 8 Accidents

1. As soon as the Competitors and the horse have entered the competition arena nobody else is allowed to enter the arena except in the case of accidents. Any person entering the arena leads to disqualification of the athlete. (Exceptions to this are in the Pre-Novice Squads, Novice Squads, Pre-Novice Individual, Novice Individual, all Walk Classes and all Para Classes where appropriate help is allowed.)
2. In special circumstances such as an accident or high risk to vaulter or horse, the test may be interrupted, and outside help may be allowed on the instruction of Judge A.
3. The Judge may terminate the test if the circumstances are deemed too dangerous for a vaulter and/or a horse. Termination should be recorded on the score sheet by Judge A.
4. An interruption in the test is recommenced on the instruction of Judge A. The duration of the interruption is recorded and a time allowance made.
5. Any vaulter involved in an accident must follow the advice given by the approved First Aid Cover.
6. The protocol on concussion is in line with FEI / BE policy and rules.

CHAPTER II ENTRIES AND COMPETITORS

Article 9 Venues and Dates of Events

1. Competition dates should be approved by the competition secretary and encouraged to be submitted as early as possible in the vaulting calendar. See Article 3.
2. Event application forms are available from the BEV Competition Secretary or from the BEV website and should be returned completed, to the BEV Competition Secretary.
3. Application forms for Regional Championships must be received a minimum of twelve weeks before the Event.
4. Application forms for National Competitions must be received a minimum of eight weeks (longer if possible) before the Event.
5. Dispensation may be given for late requests.

Article 10 Entries

1. Entries must be made in writing by Club Secretaries to the Event Secretary.
2. The full entry costs must be paid by the close of entries. Failure to do so may entail elimination.
3. Entry Fees will be fixed annually by the Management Committee and are as follows for National competitions and Regional Championships:

4. In addition, all vaulters will pay a fee of £5.00 to the Competition Organiser to cover administration costs.
5. Championship classes run over two days will differ.
6. All Competitors, Horses and Clubs must be Full members of BEV in order to enter and compete at any BEV competition. Associate members may not enter a BEV competition unless they have upgraded to Full or Youth membership.
7. Memberships must be active at the time of final entries and on the date of the competition. All renewals must therefore be completed (membership form and payment made in full) before final entries are submitted.
8. Any competitor, horse or club that does not have active full membership of BEV is not eligible to compete at BEV Competitions and their entries will be removed from the list of entries submitted. Competition Organisers are instructed to remove any entry that does not have active full membership at the date of final entries. Refund of entry fees is at the discretion of the competition organiser.

Article 11 Declarations

1. An opening time and closing time for declarations will be advised in the schedule.
2. Vaulters and Squads must be declared by the time specified in the schedule. This should be done as stated by the Organiser in the schedule. Those who do not declare by the specified time may not be allowed to compete.
3. Clubs should nominate one responsible person to make all of their declarations.
4. Entries accepted by close of declarations must be deemed valid.
5. As a courtesy, withdrawals after declarations and before the start of the Event should be notified to the Event Organiser.
6. Refund of entry fees, on production of a vet or a doctor certificate, is at the discretion of the Event Organiser.

Article 12 Vaulters

NOTE: It is the responsibility of the Competitor (Vaulters and Lungers) to ensure that they fulfil ALL criteria for the Competition and Class they have entered. Failure to do so will incur elimination.

1. Individual vaulters may vault on more than one horse in an Individual class at the discretion of competition organisers, **except at the British Championships. and regional championships**
2. Individual vaulters may not vault on the same horse more than once in a class at any competition.
3. If entering on more than one horse in a class, vaulters must indicate on the entry form which horse is to be eligible for a placing. All other horses used by that vaulter in that class will be competed H.C. and these scores can only count for gaining international qualification scores for horse or vaulter.
4. An individual vaulter may compete at National competitions and Regional Championships on the same horse in multiple individual classes but only the highest level will be eligible for a placing. **All others will be H.C. and these scores can only count for gaining international qualification scores for horse or vaulter.**
5. Squad vaulters may compete in a maximum of two squads. See Art 28.7.
6. Vaulters who are entered in a canter squad 1*, 2* or 3* may not compete in pre- novice as an individual.
7. When entries are large, Competition Organisers may, at their discretion, sub-divide Pre- Novice Individuals and Novice Individuals according to age and Walk Pas de Deux into Restricted and Open.
8. **Organisers may amalgamate age groups and or male/female categories at National Competitions. (For example all 3* competitors may compete against each other).**
9. Vaulters from other Nations must become full members of BEV to participate at Events.
10. To qualify for a title at a Regional or British Championship, a vaulter must hold a British passport and reside in GB.
11. A vaulter can only qualify for one Regional title. Vaulters must show affiliation to the Region to qualify for a title. This can be through permanent address, temporary address (for work or education) or by regular (monthly or at least twelve times in a year) attendance and support of a club in that Region either as a coach or vaulter. It must be stated on the entry that a title is being contested and a vaulter must then exclude himself/herself from contesting other titles in that year by stating this on other entries.
12. **A vaulter from any region will receive a placing rosette at a Regional Championship according to their score, but the highest placed vaulter affiliated to the Region will be awarded the Championship prize (but not necessarily a first rosette).**

13. Vaulters Eligibility – the age of the vaulter is from the 1st January in the year of the Event.

Guidelines for Vaulter age (Individuals and Pas de Deux). FEI Rules may differ from BEV Rules.

- Vaulters may compete in Child classes from the start of the year of their 12th birthday (FEI Rules) and may remain in Child classes until the end of the year of their 14th birthday. There is no lower age limit in child classes or junior pas de deux under BEV Rules.
- Vaulters may compete in Junior classes from the start of the year of their 14th birthday (but may remain in Child classes until the end of the year of their 14th birthday). They may compete in Junior classes until the end of the year of their 18th birthday. However, moving down from Junior to Child in that year is not possible at British competitions.
- Junior vaulters may compete in Senior classes from the start of the year of their 16th birthday (but may remain in Junior classes until the end of the year of their 18th birthday). However, moving down from Senior to Junior in that year is not possible at British competitions.
- Vaulters may compete in the Young vaulter classes from the start of the year of their 16th birthday and may remain in Young vaulter classes until the end of the year of their 21st birthday.
- Vaulters should note that changing age category during the year will affect ranking scores as vaulters can only accrue points in the age category they are competing in that year and points at lower age levels cannot be carried forward.

Article 13 Vaulting Horse**1. Horse Eligibility.**

Class	Horse Age
Pre-Novice Squads, Walk Classes and All Individual Classes	5 years and over
All Other Classes	7 years and over
International Events	7 years and over

2. There are no restrictions on the height of horses. For the purposes of these Rules, ponies are included as horses.
3. All breeds and types of horses are accepted.
4. Horses should be of an appropriate height and type for the size and number of vaulters competing on them.
5. All competing horses must be registered with BEV in the same name as in their passport. Competing on an un-registered horse will result in elimination from the Event. Club Secretaries should ensure that all horses are registered with BEV.
6. All horses must hold a passport and have it available for inspection at Competitions. All horses must be microchipped and vaccinated. See Art 13.18 and 13.19
7. The same horse must be used for the compulsory test, free test and technical test (if applicable) of all rounds.
8. The horse may not be used for more than one Squad canter class per Competition (does not include Pre-Novice).
9. The horse may canter to the right or to the left in any competition.
10. A horse may accrue a maximum of 8 points during any competition.
11. Horse points system:

Not complying with this rule will be referred to the Disciplinary Committee and could result in the horse being barred from competing.

12. A horse's sensory hairs (around nostrils/muzzle) should not be clipped and/ or shaven or in any other way removed, unless individual sensory hairs have been removed by a veterinarian to prevent pain or discomfort for the horse.
13. A horse which exhibits signs of lameness or distress, can be eliminated during a Competition at the discretion of Judge A in consultation with members of the Ground Jury or after a report from a Veterinary delegate.

14. Blood rules

- If the Judge at A or a BEV steward suspects fresh blood anywhere on the horse during or after the test, they will stop the horse to check for blood. If the horse shows fresh blood, it may, at the discretion of the judges and TD, be eliminated based on horse welfare grounds. If the official's thorough examination clarifies that the horse has no fresh blood, the horse may resume and finish the test.
- If a BEV Steward discovers fresh blood in the horse's mouth at the end of the test, they will inform the Judge at A, who will eliminate the Competitive Unit.
- If a BEV steward discovers fresh blood anywhere else on the horse's body (i.e. other than the horse's mouth) during the check at the end of the test, the competitive unit is not automatically eliminated. The steward shall inform the Judge at A and the TD and they will decide whether the horse is fit to continue in following competition(s) in the Event.

15. Horses may only be warmed up by full members of BEV aged 16 and over. Level 1 Lunging certificate is advised. An approved hat must be worn when ridden.

16. Horses must be allocated a number by the Event Organiser. This will be provided by the horse owner/lunger and should be attached to the bridle during the competition. The identification numbers shall be discreet on a white background, the colour of the numbers may vary.

17. Horses competing at an International Event within the UK do not need an FEI passport for CVI 1* and 2* but must have an FEI passport for CVI 3* and above. All horses at a CVI must have an FEI licence. Vaccination requirements as per FEI Rules must be adhered to.

18. All horses must be microchipped by law.

It is important that owners check that their horse has a microchip AND that this microchip is recorded on the Central Equine Database. You can check your horse's microchip at <https://www.equineregister.co.uk/home>. If it doesn't appear and your horse already has a microchip you will need to notify your PIO of the microchip number.

If your horse has not been microchipped, you will need to contact your vet to arrange for this to be done.

If your horse has a passport issued in any country outside the UK you will need to make sure that it is also recorded on the Central Equine Database, with its microchip number, within 30 days of it having arrived in the UK. If your horse has an EU passport and has been in the UK for a while, contact info@bef.co.uk or 02476 698871 to ask about how to make sure that these details are fully recorded on the Central Equine Database.

19. It is a requirement that all horses have up to date vaccinations as follows

- An initial course of two injections for primary vaccination, not less than 21 days and not more than 92 days apart, are required before being eligible to compete.
- A first booster injection must be given between 150 and 215 days after the second injection of primary vaccination.
- Subsequent booster injections must be given at regular intervals of not more than 12 months, commencing after the first booster injection.
- **The most recent booster injection must have been given within 12 months prior to the horse competing.**
- The full course or booster must have been administered at least seven days before arriving at the competition.
- FEI Rules differ.

Horses being found without adequate and up to date vaccinations will not be allowed to compete and will be barred from competing until such a time that they have been given their first and second vaccinations.

The registration of any horse found in breach of this rule will be suspended until rectified.

Article 14 Lunger

1. Lungers taking part in Competitions must be full members of BEV and be over the age of 18.
2. For reasons other than illness or injury, certified by a medical doctor or the approved First Aid cover, the reserve lunger or the lunger of another entered horse may not be used once the competition has started.
3. Lungers wishing to participate overseas at any level must have a **BEV Level 2 Lunging certificate** or above lodged with BEV.
4. Lungers subject to a disciplinary action are not permitted to participate in International Events, unless specific exemption has been granted to them by BEV.

Article 15 Salute

1. In all tests each vaulter and lunger must salute the Judge at A as a matter of courtesy before, and after, the Competition.
2. Elimination for failure to salute is at the discretion of the Ground Jury.
3. The Judge at A shall acknowledge the salutes.
4. **It is recommended that the vaulters exit the competition circle after the final salute, ahead of the horse.**
5. **Immediately after the final salute, before exiting the competition circle, the side-reins may be unfastened, and the horse walked out of the competition circle. At the latest, the side-reins must be unfastened immediately upon exiting the competition circle.**

Article 16 Dress

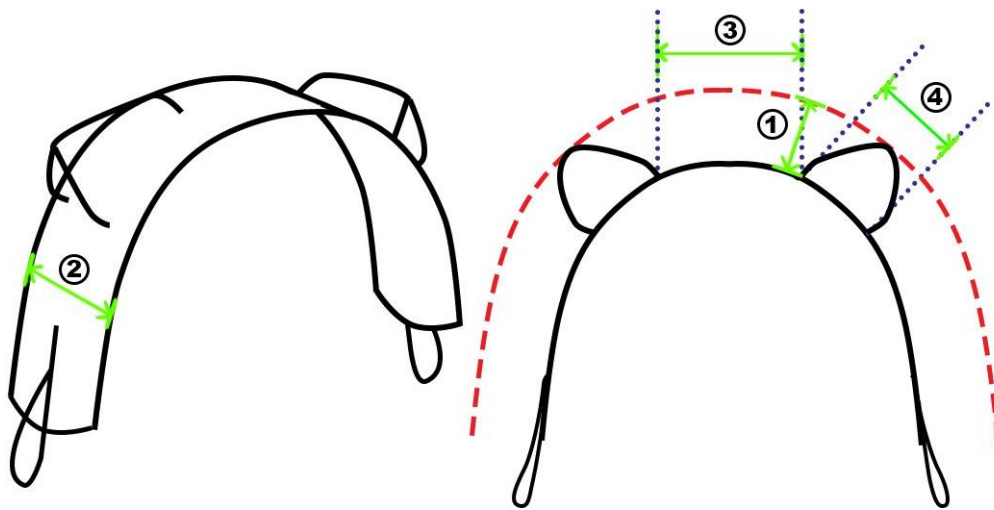
1. Dress of Squad, Individual, and Pas de Deux Vaulters must not hinder the movement of the Vaulter or the safe interaction between Vaulters during the performance.
2. Dress must in no way compromise the safety of either Vaulter or Horse.
3. Dress must not conceal the form and line of the Vaulter's body during the performance in order not to hinder the judging of the exercises.
4. Trousers must be secured to the foot and skirts may only be worn over tights or leggings.
5. Dress must be formfitting and all articles of clothing, or parts thereof, must remain attached to the Vaulter's body at all times.
6. All decorative accessories must be made of soft or cloth-like and/or pliable material.
7. Props are strictly forbidden in the arena.
8. Dress must not give the effect of nudity.
9. In Child Competitions the dress may not have any parts in skin coloured or transparent fabric, except for the arms and legs, where this is permitted.
10. Shoes must be worn, and only soft soled shoes are permitted.
11. Each Squad vaulter must wear an easily visible number 10 to 12 cm in size on the right arm, right leg or on the back.
12. During the performance, the Individual Vaulter must wear a number provided by the Competition Organisers, easily visible on the outer arm or outer leg.
13. Contravening these Articles will result in a deduction from the artistic score.

Article 17 Equipment for the Vaulting Horse

All equipment must be used without changing the purpose of its manufactured state. The use of any other equipment than described below, may entail elimination.

The equipment in the Competition Arena will be as follows:

1. Bridle with noseband.
 - 1.1. Except for the buckles and padding the headstall and noseband must be made entirely of leather or leather-like material. Padding is allowed on bridles. Nylon or other non-metal material may be used to reinforce leather in the headstall but must not be in direct contact with the horse. Elastic inserts are permitted in the crownpiece and cheek pieces only and must not be in direct contact with the horse or the bit.
 - 1.2. A browband is required, and except for the parts that attach to the crownpiece or headstall, is not required to be made of leather or leather-like material.
 - 1.3. The crownpiece of the bridle must lie immediately behind the poll and may extend forward onto the poll but must not be fitted to lie behind the skull.
 - 1.4. A throatlatch is required except when the combined noseband or Micklem bridle are used.
 - 1.5. At any level of competition, a noseband may never be so tightly fixed that it causes harm to the horse and must be checked as per the FEI Stewards Manual noseband protocol.
 - 1.6. A plain snaffle bridle is required to be used with a regular cavesson noseband, a dropped noseband, a flash noseband, a crossed noseband, a combined noseband or a Micklem or similar design of bridle.
 - 1.7. Nosebands must be flat. Leather, sheepskin or similar material may be used on any part of the bridle providing the material does not exceed three centimetres in diameter measured from the horse's skin.
2. Snaffle Bit. The Snaffle bit must have a smooth surface. Twisted and wire bits are prohibited. Bits must be made of metal, rigid plastic, or durable synthetic material and may be covered with rubber/latex. Bits must not place mechanical restraint upon the tongue. The diameter of the mouthpiece of the snaffle must be such so as not to hurt the Horse. Snaffles must have a minimum diameter of twelve millimetres (12 mm) for horses and ten millimetres (10mm) for Ponies. The diameter of the mouthpiece is measured adjacent to the rings or the cheeks of the mouthpiece.
 - 2.1. Snaffle bits may be used with loose ring, D-Ring, and Eggbutt cheeks. Single or double jointed snaffles may also be used with upper or lower cheeks, or full cheeks. Loose rings may have a sleeve fitted around part of the ring.
 - 2.2. Flexible rubber or synthetic mouthpieces are permitted. Unjointed mouthpieces must be flexible.
 - 2.3. A snaffle may have up to two joints. A barrel or ball joint is permitted as the centre link in a double-jointed snaffle, however, the surface of the centre piece must be solid with no moveable parts other than a roller. The centre link may be tilted in a different orientation from the mouthpiece but must have rounded edges and may not have the effect of a tongue plate.
 - 2.4. A double jointed snaffle or snaffle with rotating mouthpiece may be shaped to allow tongue relief. The maximum height of the deviation is 30mm from the lower part of tongue side to the highest part of the deviation. The widest part of the deviation must be where the mouthpiece contacts the tongue and must have a minimum width of 30mm. The mouthpiece of a jointed or unjointed snaffle may be shaped in a curve within the dimensions specified above.
3. Rubber bit guards are permitted.
4. Lunge cavessons may be used instead of a bridle. They can be used with or without a snaffle. If used with a snaffle they must adhere to the rules above.
5. Two side reins. (Standing reins or auxiliary reins are not permitted).
6. Vaulting surcingle with underpad and girth. Under the girth (description and Measurements, see diagram), an underpad and/or pieces of sheepskin may be used for skin protection. The surcingle has two solid handles with two loops, one on each side. One short extra strap made of leather, may be fixed between the inner edges of the right and left handle. This strap may be wrapped with material suitable to provide protection from injury.



1. Maximum distance measured from flat face of surcingle to outer point of handles 180mm.
2. Maximum width of weight bearing flat face of surcingle to be no greater than 180mm.
3. Maximum distance between the right hand side and left hand side surcingle handles 240mm.
4. Maximum distance between the centre of the top and bottom fixing points on surcingle handles 280mm.

Note --- these are the maximum dimensions, smaller dimensions are acceptable and a tolerance of 20mm will be accepted.

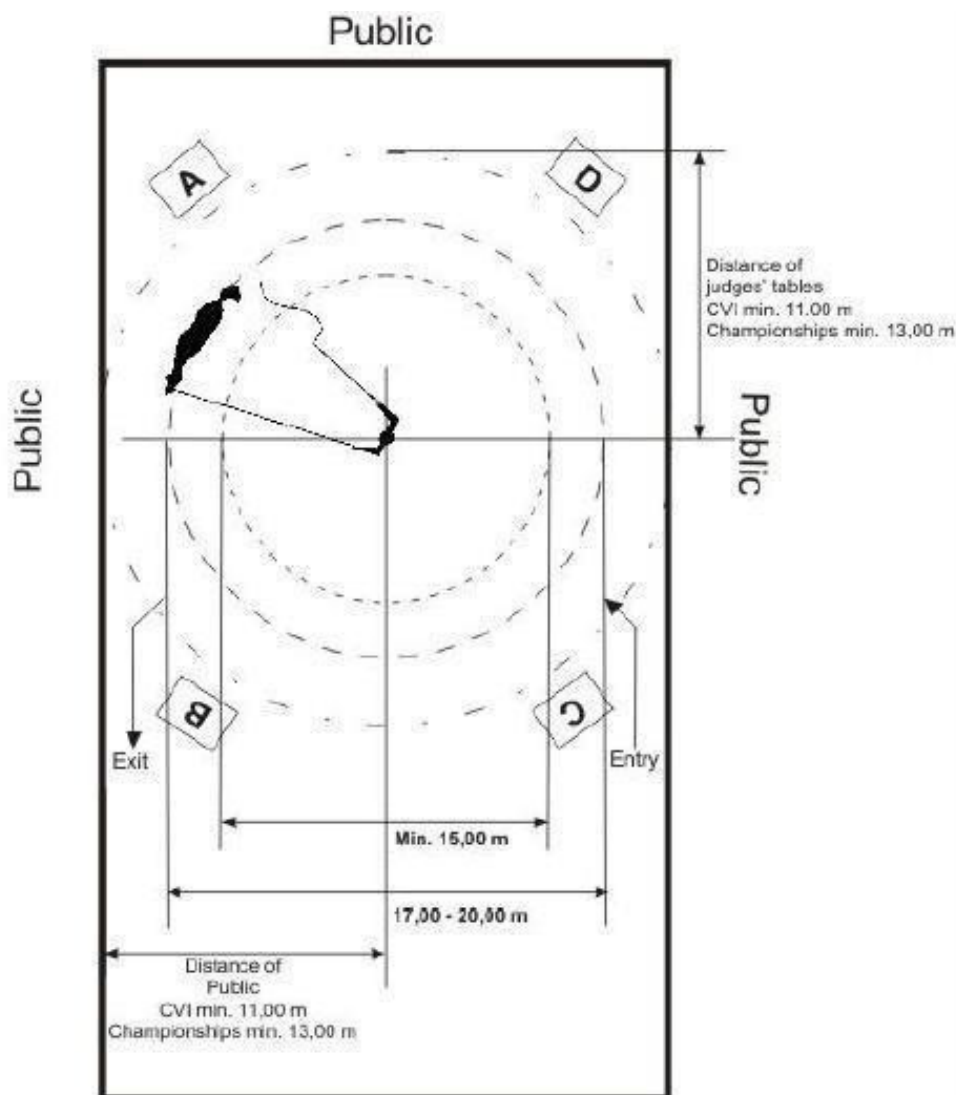
7. Lunge line is mandatory and must be attached to the inner ring of the bit (not over the head or to the outer ring of the bit) or to the lunge cavesson.
8. Bandages and/or brushing/overreach boots are optional. Hoof boots are allowed.
9. Ear hoods and plugs are permitted for all Events and may also provide noise reduction and must allow the ears to move freely. Ear hoods must not cover the horse's eyes. The ear hoods should be discreet in colour and design. Ear hoods may not be attached to the noseband.
10. Back pad is mandatory and must be made out of a materials which conforms itself to the Horse's back and reduces the impact of external forces (by the Vaulters). One gel pad is allowed in addition to the back pad.
11. The back pad, which may be checked by the Steward and/or a Judge at any time on the Horse must have the following dimensions: non-compliance will result in elimination from the competition
 - Max. 80 cm from the back edge of the surcingle to the back
 - Max. 30 cm from the front edge of the surcingle to the neck
 - Max. 90 cm from side to side the lowest point to the lowest point
 - If checked on the Horse, the allowed tolerance may not exceed 3cm, i.e. 93 cm
 - Max. 4.0 cm thick including cover
 - Max. total length 1.10 m, with no more than 30 cm in front of the surcingle
12. The Lunger must use a lunging whip.
13. The equipment in the warm-up arena can include the following:
 - Auxiliary reins are allowed.
 - Double bridle is allowed when riding.
 - Side Reins and/or auxiliary reins must not be fastened in place for an excessive period. After such times they must be unfastened, and the Horse allowed to move freely for a period of time before the side reins are reattached.
 - Lunge rein must be attached to the inner ring of the bit or to the lunge cavesson.

- Double lunge/long reining is allowed, when the lunge is attached in a way that it is only being used as a long rein (attached to the ring of the bit). A double lunge may not be used as a draw rein

14. The equipment may be changed for the Compulsory test, Free test or Technical test, 1st and 2nd round.

Article 18 The Arena

1. The Competition space in the arena must be at least 20m x 25m.
2. The arena surface must be of a suitable material.
3. When a Competition is held indoors, the height must be at least 5m.
4. The public must be at least 11m away from the centre of the lunging circle. (See Appendix C)
5. A practice area is compulsory and should be at least 20m x 20m. It is recommended that there should be three or more practice circles.
6. It is recommended that the judges are placed on a raised dais about 50-60cm above the arena.
7. The judges' tables should be at least 11m but preferably 14m away from the centre of the circle. The public should be an adequate distance from the judges.
8. The centre point of the competition circle should be marked.



CHAPTER III SPECIAL CONSIDERATIONS

Article 19 Prize - Giving (See also Article 68)

1. The prize-giving ceremony should be given importance and should be in the arena with maximum ceremony. **Arena 1 and Arena 2 prize-giving may be held separately.**
2. It is recommended that if horses are required to parade, Clubs should be notified prior to prize-giving. If horses are requested to be presented, ~~they should wear vaulting tack with walk length side reins. Back pad is optional~~ they should wear a bridle.
3. **Horses invited to prize-giving** should be kept separate from the vaulters in the interests of safety.
4. All vaulters must receive a rosette.
5. Lungers should receive rosettes.
6. A prize for 'Best Horse' in any category is at the discretion of the Event Organiser and should be based on the **highest final score with one competitor.**
7. Permission from the Event Organiser or Technical Delegate must be obtained if a Competitor needs to leave before prize-giving. Every effort should be made to attend prize-giving but if this is not possible then a representative should be nominated.

Article 20 Abuse of the Horse, Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication

1. The General Regulations and Veterinary Regulations of the FEI apply. It is the responsibility of the horse owners, trainers and lungers to familiarise themselves with these rules.
2. Each person who becomes a Member of BEV agrees to be bound by the BE Equine Anti-Doping and Controlled Medication Rules ("BEFAR"). Copies of BEFAR and copies of the Equine Prohibited Substances List are available at www.bef.co.uk. Accordingly, by becoming a member such person shall be deemed to have agreed:
 - a) to be bound by, and to comply strictly with, BEFAR;
 - b) to submit to the authority of the BE and/or of BEV to apply, police and enforce BEFAR;
 - c) to provide all requested assistance to the BE and BEV (as applicable) in the application, policing and enforcement of BEFAR, including (without limitation) cooperating fully with any investigation, results management exercise, and/or proceedings being conducted pursuant to BEFAR in relation to any potential Anti-Doping or Controlled Medication Rule Violation(s), except where the FEI has jurisdiction over the potential Anti-Doping or Controlled Medication Violation.
 - d) to submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of any BE first instance Hearing Body convened under BEFAR, to hear and determine charges and related issues arising under BEFAR
 - e) to submit to the exclusive jurisdiction of any Sports Resolution UK Panel convened under BEFAR to hear and determine appeals made pursuant to BEFAR; and
 - f) not to bring any proceedings in any court or other forum that are inconsistent with the foregoing submission to the jurisdiction of the BE first instance tribunal, and Sports Resolution UK.

3. All British vaulting judges must be approved by the Management Committee and must be full members of BEV.
4. National Candidate judges are required to attend an accreditation procedure, as laid down by the Management Committee, in order to upgrade.
5. The president of the Ground Jury has the right to reject or amend the scores of a National Candidate Judge at a Competition. A National Candidate Judge should not form part of the Ground Jury at the British Championships or Selection Trials.
6. A correctly briefed writer must be provided for each Judge and a Time-Keeper must be provided for Judge A.
7. Writers and time-keepers must be over 16 years old.
8. Candidate & National Judges must attend FEI Seminars and / or relevant CPD at least every two years.
9. All Judges must submit a log of competitions judged and Seminars/CPD attended to the Management Committee by 31st December each year.
10. Technical Delegates and Chief Stewards must be approved by the Management Committee and must be full members of BEV.
11. The Management Committee can provide a list of approved Officials.

CHAPTER IV TIMING AND SCORING

Article 22 Timing

1. Within 30 seconds after the signal (bell) is given to enter the arena, the Squad, Individual or Pas de Deux must salute. Before beginning the performance, the horse must be trotted on the circle until Judge A rings the bell. 30 seconds after the bell following the trot circle, the first exercise must be commenced. Elimination for non-compliance is at the discretion of the Ground Jury.
2. The time allowed for the Test begins at the moment the first vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse and ends with the time limit. The judging ends when the last vaulter touches the ground after the final dismount. Only exercises already in progress when reaching the time limit may be finished and will be included in the evaluation for Technique and Artistic Scores.
3. For Individuals there is no time limit for the Compulsory Test. If more than one vaulter is starting on the same horse, the next vaulter begins his performance immediately after the Vault-Off of the previous vaulter without waiting for a signal. (See Clause 33.5)

4. A bell is used by the Judge at A to signal to the competitors. It is used on the following occasions:
- To give the signal for the Competitor(s) to enter the arena (Judge at A should stand up);
 - To give the signal to start the Test;
 - To interrupt the Test to solve any issue with the music (music not starting etc.);
 - To signal the end of the time allowed;
 - To signal that the time and music is stopped after a fall and the Vaulters is unable to continue immediately or to return to the line. The Test must be continued within 30 seconds after the signal to resume;
 - To give the signal to stop a Competitor or Performance when the horse shows any signs of irregularity or lameness, is out of control, or is a danger to the Vaulters;
 - To give the signal to stop a Competitor or Performance in unforeseen circumstances, this includes repair or adjustment of equipment, or any other situation requiring immediate attention. The timing and the music is stopped. The Test must be continued within 30 seconds after the signal to resume;
 - After an interruption, the clock is started again when the vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse. In unclear situations the Judge at A, the lunger and/or the vaulter may communicate.

Article 24 Horse Score

1. Judging of the horse begins with entering the arena and ends with the final dismount.
2. If more than one Individual vaulter or Pas-de-Deux is on one horse, the general impression of the Entry, Salute and Trot Round will be taken into account for all vaulters on that horse.
3. For criteria for scoring the horse in canter classes, see FEI Guidelines.
4. See Appendix A for Horse Score in Walk.

Article 25 Exercise Score

1. In the Compulsory Test, all required exercises get a score.
2. In the Technical Test, the required technical exercises get a score. The performance of additional exercises will be scored separately.
3. Judging of the Performance begins when the vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse and ends with touching the ground after the final dismount.
4. For criteria for scoring the exercises see FEI Guidelines.

Article 26 Technique Score

1. In the Technique Score the Difficulty (if demanded in the test) and the quality of the Free Style Exercises (the Performance) are scored.
2. Judging of the Degree of Difficulty begins with the moment the vaulter (first vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse and ends with the time limit.
3. Judging of the Performance begins with the moment the first vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse and ends with touching the ground after the final dismount of the last vaulter.
4. For criteria for scoring the Technique see FEI Guidelines.

Article 27 Artistic Score

1. In the Artistic Score the structure and the choreography of the test will be scored.
2. Judging the Artistic Score begins with the moment the first vaulter touches the surcingle, the pad or the horse and ends with the time limit.
3. For criteria for scoring the Artistic see FEI Guidelines. 1*, 2*, 3* will be judged as per FEI guidelines and Novice and Pre-Novice will be judged according to FEI child 1* guidelines.

CHAPTER V SQUAD VAULTING COMPETITION

Article 28 General

1. A Squad is composed of six vaulters accompanied by the lunger and horse.
2. Organisers may choose to allow walk squads to be composed of 4-8 vaulters accompanied by the lunger, the horse and assistants as required. This should be stated on the schedule.
3. The Compulsory Test and Free Test must be shown on the same horse in all rounds.
4. Senior Squad shall follow FEI rules for Squad vaulting Senior CVI 1*, 2*, or 3*;
5. Junior Squad shall follow FEI rules for Squad Vaulting Junior CVI 2*;
6. Pre-Novice Squad & Novice Squad shall follow BEV Rules.
7. Vaulters may vault in a maximum of two Squads at the same or different levels, but each Squad must have no more than two vaulters from another Squad.
8. The Squad vaulting competition consists of two Tests, the Compulsory Test and the Free Test.
9. All six vaulters must perform all tests. If less than six vaulters perform in the Compulsory Test, all Exercises not shown will receive a zero. In the Free Test, for each vaulter not competing, a deduction will be given.
10. The Compulsory Test and the Free test must be separated by an interval of at least one hour except for Pre-Novice squads where the Free Test may follow immediately on from the Compulsory Test.
11. The Management Committee reserves the right to judge additional rounds of vaulting for Squads at a one-day Selection Trial.
12. Assisted mounts in **halt**, walk, trot or canter are allowed in Pre-Novice Squads and Novice Squads.
13. The mount in the Compulsory Test is not scored in Pre-Novice Squads or in Novice Squads. It is recommended that an assistant be present to help vaulters mount. Deductions will be made for vaulters who take more than four strides to begin basic seat after leaving the ground. This is to ensure the welfare of the horse.
14. Unassisted Mounts in the **Novice** Free Test will be scored.
15. It is recommended that the Compulsory and the Free Test be performed to music.

Article 31 Squad Free Test

1. In the Free Test the vaulters have the opportunity to show their artistry. They may plan an original programme around their own capabilities, ideas and specialties in single, double and triple free-style exercises.
2. No more than three vaulters may be on the horse at one time. At least two vaulters must remain in contact with the horse, otherwise these exercises are not scored.
3. Each vaulter must perform at least one exercise.
4. A Free Test consists of static and dynamic exercises. In order to be counted in the degree of difficulty a static exercise must be held for at least three canter strides. A dynamic exercise should only be counted in the degree of difficulty if, in its execution, the vaulter's centre of gravity is displaced other than in the direction of the effect of gravity.

5. The performance is to take place with the horse and therefore no exercises or dance moves on the ground are allowed. Elimination for non compliance is at the discretion of the Ground Jury.
6. Squad Free Tests are listed below:

Squad Free Test 1 (Rein of your choice)

A Squad Free Test 1 may include single, double and triple exercise, with a maximum of 6 static triple exercises.

20 free style exercises will be considered. **Performed in canter.**

Squad Free Test 2 (Rein of your choice)

A Squad Free Test 2 includes single, double and triple exercise. 25 free style exercises will be considered. **Performed in canter.**

Squad Free Test N (Rein of your choice)

A Squad Free Test N includes single and double exercises. A Maximum of two vaulters are allowed on the horse at any one time.

There is No Degree of Difficulty.

There is no limit on the number of moves performed. **Performed in canter.**

Squad Free Test PN (Rein of your choice)

A Squad Free Test PN includes single, double and triple exercise. There is No Degree of Difficulty.

There is no limit on the number of moves performed. Performed in Walk.

CHAPTER VI THE INDIVIDUAL VAULTING COMPETITION

Article 33 General

1. The individual vaulter is accompanied by the lungers and the vaulting horse. Outside assistance is not allowed except in Pre-Novice, Novice and Para Vaulting.
2. The Compulsory Test, Free Test and Technical Test must be shown on the same horse in all rounds.
3. All participants on the same horse must perform the Compulsory Test and the Free Test in the same running order.
4. The Compulsory Test and the Free Test must be separated by an interval of at least one hour unless dispensation is sought from the Management Committee. (Exception Pre- Novice Individual).
5. When more than one vaulter is starting on the same horse, the next Competitor may only enter the circle when the previous vaulter lands the vault-off. An earlier entry will incur elimination of the incoming vaulter.
6. It is recommended that the Compulsory and Free Test be performed with music.
7. Vaulters in 1*, 2*, 3* may move between Levels as follows:
 - may move up one or more Levels
 - may move down one Level but must compete at the highest level class done that year at the British Championships
 - may move down more than one Level but must compete H.C.
 - may compete H.C. at any Level
8. Pre-Novice and Novice vaulters can move up and down between classes throughout the year but at Regional and National Championships they must compete at the highest level they have participated in during the year.
9. Competing H.C. excludes the vaulter from being placed in results, receiving prizes, being awarded titles or gaining points for rankings. These results can count for gaining international qualification scores for horse or vaulter.

3. Leg to middle and back in rhythm of four canter strides with simple dismount to the inside (Dismount is not scored)

Article 35 Technical Test: see FEI Rules

Article 36 Individual Free Test

1. The lunger, horse and all vaulters performing on the same horse enter the arena at the same time. No one else may enter the arena except in Walk, Pre-Novice, Novice and Para Classes.
2. A Free Test consists of static and dynamic exercises. A static exercise must be held for a minimum of three canter strides (or a minimum of three walk steps in walk classes).
3. During a Free Test at all levels of classes - due to high level of risk - the top of the vaulter's head must not be below the bottom of the stirrup and will result in elimination from that class.
4. Free Test 2. (Rein of your choice)
See FEI Rules and Guidelines for Individual Free Test.
5. Free Test 1. (Rein of your choice)
See FEI Rules and Guidelines for Individual Free Test (No Degree of Difficulty).
6. Free Test N (Rein of your choice).
One minute Freestyle in canter, assisted mounts are permitted, but will not be scored. Unassisted mounts will be scored. The emphasis is on Performance, Artistic value and harmony with the horse. There will be no score for Difficulty.
7. Free Test PN (Rein of your choice).
One minute Freestyle in Walk, assisted mounts are permitted but will not be scored. The emphasis is on Performance, Artistic value and harmony with the horse. There will be no score for Difficulty.

Article 37 Scoring of the Individual Free Test

1. The maximum score is 10.00 and decimals are allowed.
2. Free Test 2
 - 1 Judge for Horse
 - 2 Judges for Technique (70% Performance, 30% Difficulty)
 - 1 Judge for Artistic (50% Positions on the horse, 50% Music interpretation)

3. Free Test 1, N & PN
 - 1 Judge for Horse
 - 2 Judges for Technique (100% Performance, No Difficulty)
 - 1 Judge for Artistic (50% Positions on the horse, 50% Music interpretation)
4. Technique Score (Difficulty & Performance)
5. Scoring Difficulty
6. The scoring of the exercises:

Risk	R	1.3 points
Difficult	D	0.9 points
Medium	M	0.4 points
Easy	E	0.0 points

(See FEI Guidelines & Code of Points)

7. No points are awarded for:
 - Each static exercise held for less than three canter strides.
 - Each Free Test exercise started after the time limit.
 - Exercises from **any** Compulsory Programme.
 - Each exercise not performed in canter. **(except in Pre Novice)**
 - Repetitions of any exercise.
8. Only the 10 most difficult exercises will be considered.

Article 38 Total Marks

1. The total marks from the Compulsory and Free Test are added together and divided by two. The result will be rounded off to the third decimal point.
2. Judges scoring Technique must write down the degree of difficulty of all exercises and their performance deductions on the score sheet.

CHAPTER VII PAS DE DEUX VAULTING COMPETITIONS

Article 39 General

1. The Pas de Deux Competition is composed of two vaulters (any gender), the lunger and the horse.
2. **No Compulsory Test is used for any Pas de Deux.**
3. The Free Test is 2 minutes for Senior, 1½ minutes for Junior, 1*, and Walk.
4. For composition of the Free Test see FEI Rules.
5. Walk Pas de Deux to be marked as canter Pas de Deux without a degree of difficulty.

6. Pas de Deux age groups:

Senior Pas de Deux	From 16 Years
1* Pas de Deux	No age Limit

Article 40 Scoring of the Compulsory Test

Article 40 Scoring of the Free Test

- 2 Judges for Technique (70% Performance, 30% Difficulty)
- 1 Judge for Artistic (50% Positions on the horse, 50% Music interpretation)

Technique Score - In 1* Competitions, Novice and Pre-Novice (Junior and Senior) the Technique Score represents only the Performance of the Free Style Exercises.

In 2* and above Competitions (Junior and Senior), the Technique Score is divided into the Performance (70%) and the Difficulty (30%).

The Artistic Score in the Free Test is divided into two parts, Structure of the Free Test 50% (Variety of exercises 25% and Variety of position 25%) and Choreography 50% (Unity of composition and complexity 30% and Music interpretation 20%).

CHAPTER VIII CONDUCT AND DISCIPLINE**Article 41 Agreement**

1. All participants, by their application for membership of BEV or an affiliated Club, agree to be bound by the BEV Memorandum and Articles of Association and all Rules, Regulations and By-Laws made there under and have agreed that the decisions of the Management Committee, Stewards and other competent authorities of BEV given in accordance therewith shall be binding upon them.
2. It is the responsibility of all participants to ensure that they are aware of and familiar with the Rules. All participants competing under these Rules shall be deemed to have knowledge of these Rules as amended from time to time.

Article 42 Conduct of Participants

1. No participant shall:
 - a) Contravene any rule set by the BEV or affiliated Club, the BE, the FEI, Testing Authority, or UK Sport.
 - b) Conduct himself or herself at an Event in a manner, which is offensive to other participants and the public.
 - c) Argue at an Event with an Official, use abusive or threatening language or behave with incivility or contempt towards an Official.
 - d) Ill-treat a horse, in any way, at an Event whether inside or outside the competition area.
 - e) Deliberately use the action of the bit as a means of punishment and/or misuse any item of equipment in a manner likely to cause pain or discomfort to the horse.
 - f) Allow a horse for which they are the person responsible, to compete in an Event under the influence of a forbidden substance. The person responsible shall be in breach of this Rule if the analysis of a sample taken from the said horse shows the presence in its body fluids of any substance, which is either a forbidden substance or one of its metabolites, or a substance, which cannot be traced to normal and ordinary feeding and which, by its nature, is likely to affect the performance of the horse.
 - g) Unreasonably refuse to allow a horse which has competed or is about to compete at an Event to undergo any properly authorised test or examination if requested to do so by an Officer of the Testing Authorities, BEFAR or the Organising Committee. See [Chapter III, Article 20](#).
2. A participant shall be in breach of this Rule if:
 - a) The analysis of a sample taken from him or her, shows the presence in his or her body fluids any quantity of a substance which is a forbidden or one of its metabolites, or of a specified amount of an endogenous substance subject to quantitative analysis. Prohibited and restricted substances are listed on the BE web site.
 - b) He or she refuses to give a sample of his or her body fluids for the purpose of control of forbidden substances.
 - c) He or she conducts himself or herself in such a manner that he or she has or may have committed or has or may have been party or privy to any breach of any provisions of the Memorandum and Articles of Association of BEV or of any Rule, Regulation or By-Law of a BEV affiliated Club or BE, FEI or UK Sport, or any of the Testing Authorities. A participant shall be in breach of this Rule in the event that any person who assists, represents or acts on behalf of or in the employment of such participant during the course of an Event conducts themselves in such a manner that, were they a member of BEV, they would themselves be in breach of any of the provisions of these rules.
 - d) He or she conducts himself or herself in a manner that is prejudicial to the interests of BEV.
 - e) He or she unreasonably fails or refuses to assist the Chief Steward, Stewards or their Officers, Officials of the Testing Authorities or the Management Committee in their investigations of complaints of misconduct by Members.
 - f) He or she makes, either orally or in writing, to an Officer of BEV, Testing Authorities or Officials of an Event, a statement on any matter covered by the Rules, which he or she does not or could not reasonably believe to be true.
 - g) He or she competes and/or transports horses to an Event without a valid passport.
 - h) He or she competes at an Event for which the horse, lunger and/or vaulter are not fully qualified or eligible.
 - i) Having indicated his or her availability for selection for an official British national team, unreasonably fails or refuses to compete in such team if selected.
 - j) He or she exercises any of the rights or privileges of BEV membership while suspended from BEV, or assists, represents, or acts on behalf of any other Member of BEV at an event held under the rules of the FEI or any Foreign National Federation while suspended from all rights and privileges of participation.

Article 43 Complaints of Misconduct

1. Any person wishing to make a complaint of misconduct by a participant in an Event must do so in writing to the Chairman or, where appointed, to the Technical Delegate. If after preliminary investigation the Chairman or Technical Delegate considers that a prima facie case of misconduct exists, he or she will refer it to the Management Committee, subject to the FEI or other Authority electing not to take disciplinary action.
2. The Management Committee may, at its discretion, form a Disciplinary Panel to investigate the complaint and report to and make recommendations to the Management Committee on a course of action. When the Chairman or Technical Delegate receives a complaint of an alleged breach of conduct concerning forbidden substances, as described under Clause 42.2.a, they may refer the complaint to an independent review body, to confirm or otherwise that the testing procedures used are fair and reasonable.

Article 44 Notice of Complaint

1. When a case is referred, notice of the time and place of the Disciplinary Panel meeting will be sent to the participant against whom a complaint has been made at least 21 days before the date of such meeting, together with details of the nature of the complaint and the names of any witnesses.
2. Where three weeks' notice has not been possible the Disciplinary Panel may abridge the time period in appropriate circumstances.

Article 45 Rights of Participants at Disciplinary Panel Meetings

1. A participant whose conduct is referred to the Disciplinary Panel may appear in person to answer the complaint against him or her at the Disciplinary Panel meeting and may call and examine witnesses.
2. In the alternative, at the discretion of the Disciplinary Panel, a participant may submit written evidence and statements for consideration in his or her absence.
3. If a participant fails or elects not to appear before the Disciplinary Panel the Disciplinary Panel may reach a decision and impose a penalty in his or her absence.
4. A participant shall, if they so desire, be represented by a third party before the Disciplinary Panel. A participant under the age of 18 must always be accompanied by a parent, guardian or other responsible adult.
5. Whether or not a participant is legally represented, BEV may be legally represented.

Article 46 Powers of the Management Committee to Impose Penalties

1. If after considering all the evidence, the Disciplinary Panel decides that the complaint of misconduct is upheld it may recommend to the Management Committee any one or more of the penalties shown below:
 - a) That such participant be reprimanded and cautioned as to his or her future conduct.
 - b) That such participant be suspended from all or any of the rights and privileges of participation for a period not exceeding two years.
 - c) That any horse belonging to and/or being ridden, lunged or vaulted on by such participant at the time of the misconduct be debarred from competing in any Event affiliated to BEV or any other National Federation or to the FEI for a period not exceeding 12 months.
 - d) That such participant pays a fine and/or costs of bringing the case. This will be decided by the Management Committee, giving due consideration to the gravity of the misconduct.
 - e) That such participant refund any Sports Council, Lottery or Exchequer funding, up to a maximum of one year's gross payments made directly to him or her, and/or be disqualified for a period of up to one year from further payments.
 - f) The Management Committee shall give reasons for its decision to the participant in writing.

Article 47 Immediate Suspension

1. A participant may be summarily suspended from all rights and privileges of participation at Events following conviction in a British Court of Law of any equestrian related offence, pending a full investigation by the Management Committee at an enquiry under Article 43.
2. Such suspension shall be approved by three members of the Management Committee, in writing, and may take effect from the date of conviction or such date as the Management Committee shall decide and shall remain in force at the Management Committee's absolute discretion until a full hearing under Article 44 and shall notify the participant forthwith.

Article 48 Notice of Findings, Penalties and Appeals

1. The Chairman will, within seven days of the Management Committee's decision, notify the complainant and the participant in writing of the findings of the Disciplinary Panel and of any penalties imposed.
2. Any participant whose conduct has been referred to the Disciplinary Panel under Article 43 who is dissatisfied with the Management Committee's final decision may, within 28 days of the decision, appeal to BE and failing that to the Sports Dispute Resolution Panel (SDRP). Terms of reference for the SDRP can be obtained from the offices of BE upon request.
3. Notice of the findings of the Management Committee will not be published until the expiry of the 28-day Appeal period, and then only at the discretion of the Chairman.

Article 49 Summary Powers of the Chairman

1. The Chairman may, where he/she considers that a participant is in breach of these Rules but that the breach is of a minor nature:
 - a) Issue a first warning which shall be in writing, citing the Rule being contravened and including an outline of the circumstances of the case and the reason for the warning.
 - b) Call the participant for interview, at a mutually convenient location. In such cases any involved Member shall have been informed of the request. A record of the circumstances of the case and an outline of the interview will be kept on file. A copy of the record will be sent to the participant within seven days of the interview. If appropriate, having heard the participant's explanation the Chairman may issue a formal warning of the participant's future conduct which shall include an outline of the circumstances of the case and the reason for the warning.
2. A second written warning for contravention of the same Rule within three years of the first warning will result in suspension of the Member (s).
3. Written warnings may be referred to the Management Committee, when considering the penalty to be imposed for a further breach of the Rules.
4. Where any participant objects in writing to the complaint being dealt with, under this Rule, the Chairman shall refer the matter to the Disciplinary Panel for the matter to be dealt with by way of a hearing. Article 45.

Article 50 Summary Powers of a Team Manager/Chef d'Equipe

1. The Chef d'Equipe or his/her deputy, whilst accompanying participants on a course of training, a tour or team visit (within GB or abroad) shall have the power to regulate, control and/or adjudicate upon the conduct of participants. He/she shall have the power to direct that a participant be suspended from taking part in the course of training or in any competition taking place on the tour or team visit when the participant's conduct amounts to a breach under Article 43. A formal complaint shall be made by the Chef d'Equipe to the Chairman pursuant to Article 44 about the participant's conduct.

Article 51 Indebtedness

1. Any participant who fails to discharge any indebtedness to BEV or affiliated Clubs may receive notification from the Chairman that such or any part of such indebtedness must be paid within 30 days.

2. If the debt remains unpaid the participant's membership may be revoked by the Management Committee. A participant will be deemed responsible for any debts incurred by or on his behalf as a participant. In the event of a dispute as to the debt notified to the Chairman in writing the matter shall be referred to the Management Committee before any suspension is imposed.
3. An Event Organiser and/or their committee shall be fully liable for any fines incurred prior, during or after said Event. BEV will not accept responsibility/liability for such fines and if approached to do so may take legal action against the Event Organiser.

Article 52 Indebtedness at an Event

1. If an Organiser or Organising Committee makes a written complaint under Article 43 of the failure of a participant to make payment for goods or services provided for or at an Event, the Chairman may, on investigating the circumstances, suspend the participant's membership until payment is made.
2. On receipt of a complaint the Chairman shall notify the said participant of his or her indebtedness in writing. Should the participant concerned dispute the facts of his or her indebtedness and the Chairman fails to resolve the matter to the satisfaction of those concerned, the matter shall be referred to the Management Committee.

Article 53 Suspensions

1. In the event a participant's membership is suspended by BEV or any Testing Authority, he or she will automatically be suspended from any rights and privileges of affiliated member bodies of BEV.

CHAPTER IX RULES FOR SELECTION AND DE-SELECTION

Article 54 Preamble

1. UK Sport is responsible for the corporate governance of sport in the UK and its principles underlying sport are endorsed by BE.
2. The Rules for selection and de-selection are produced by BEV in accordance with such principles.
3. The Management Committee will publish a Selection Criteria annually by 1st January.
4. Should any conflict arise between the Selection Criteria and these Rules, the Selection Criteria shall apply and be paramount.
5. Changes to the selection policy once published will only be permitted in exceptional circumstances and will be notified to all athletes who have put themselves forward for selection.

Article 55 Objectives

1. These Rules set out the minimum standards for everyone involved in the selection and de-selection process and should be read in conjunction with the current Selection Criteria. See Clause 59.1.
2. To establish a fair, transparent and robust framework to cover all aspects of the governance and management of selection and de-selection for any Event. Within this process of selection, it is incumbent on the Management Committee and Selection Panel to make sound and justifiable decisions that are open to scrutiny. All decisions should be based on clear, objective, sport-specific criteria, and communicated in an open and timely manner.
3. The Management Committee intends to be fair to all its Members and comply with its legal requirements. Having Rules based on the principles of human rights, protects the interests of all parties involved. This policy should build trust between all parties.
4. Implementation of these Rules should allow vaulters, lungers and coaches to prepare for major Events without the distraction caused by disputes.
5. The clear objective of the selection process is to select the best Squads, Individuals and Pas des Deux for any Event, in an impartial and non-discriminatory manner.

Article 56 Selection Panel

1. The Management Committee will appoint the Selection Panel. It will consist of a minimum of three members chosen from appropriate and suitably qualified candidates
2. The names of its members and their specific roles shall be announced to all Members.
3. The Selection Panel shall draft the selection criteria for ratification by the Management Committee.
4. Every effort will be made to ensure that the composition of the Selection Panel is representative of the Members.
5. The Selection Panel must be free from conflict of interest or bias.
6. The Chairman of the Management Committee (or his/her representative) will brief the Selection Panel of their roles and responsibilities.
7. Decisions, notes and minutes of the Selection Panel will be recorded and must include explanation justifying any decisions reached. These records must be accessible to members of the Management Committee.
8. All decisions of the Selection Panel will be ratified by the Management Committee.
9. Objections by Members to any person elected to the Selection Panel should be put in writing to the Chairman.
10. The Selection Panel may in its discretion de-select any Competitor who fails to comply with any of these Rules. Such Competitor shall first be given reasonable opportunity to rectify his or her failure.

Article 57 Appeals Panel

1. An appeals process will be in place to deal with all issues relating to selection and de- selection.
2. Upon appeal an Appeals Panel will be formed with a minimum of three Members different to those on the Selection Panel. They will review the appeal.
3. Appeals that cannot be resolved by the Appeals Panel will be submitted to BE for their determination.
4. The Chairman of BEV, must be notified of any documentation relating to an appeal that is submitted by the Appeals Panel to BE.
5. The Appeals Panel will be fully appraised of the appeal.
6. An appeal can only be made on grounds that selection or de-selection was not made according to these Rules and the Selection Criteria.
7. Costs will follow the guidelines recommended by the FEI
8. Full, written justification must be provided for any decision made as follows:
 - To uphold the appeal, which may result in the re-instatement of the Competitor
 - To reject the appeal.

Article 58 Responsibilities - Management Committee, Selection Panel & Competitor

1. All Events to which this selection process is applied must have a clearly written Selection Criteria.
2. Every Competitor shall sign an agreement with the Management Committee which sets out their respective roles and responsibilities including, in particular, the Competitor's responsibility to familiarise himself/herself with the Rules and the FEI rules relating to prohibited substances.
3. Every owner, trainer and lunge shall sign an agreement with the Management Committee requiring them to comply with all current rules relating to the welfare of horses and prohibited substances. The agreement will include requirement to notify the Selection Panel/ Management Committee immediately of any change in the competitive availability, health or soundness of any horse put up for, or accepted for, selection that will affect the horse's selection status
4. Vaulters shall make available to the Selection Panel performance records if required.
5. The Management Committee will declare in a timely, effective and transparent manner those

selection events/training programmes specifically listed within the Selection Criteria. In the event of a selection Event being specified in the Selection Criteria, the organisers of the Event must ensure that judges at the Event have no potential conflict of interest and do not coach, lunge or have ownership of the horses for any of the vaulters seeking selection who are competing at that Event. At an Event declared for selection purposes, all nominated candidates shall have an equal opportunity to attend. Consideration should be given to personal circumstances - school/university/work commitments or family events out with the Competitor's control. These should be reasonably taken into account. If a selection Event is an International Event, where limits are placed on the number of entries per Nation, then all vaulters put forward for selection must have equal opportunity to attend the Event.

6. British Horses selected for WEG must undertake a mandatory vet check with an agreed Vet, the result of which will be presented to the Selection Panel and Management Committee for ratification of selection.

CHAPTER X QUALIFICATIONS FOR CVI's

Article 59 Notes on Qualification.

1. All British Competitors must be full members of BEV.
2. All Competitors must hold an FEI Competitor's Licence (valid for one year) which can be obtained from the BEV nominated person.
3. All competitors (vaulters and lungers), coaches and parents must have attended an online 'Zoom Performance Training which includes antidoping training within the 18 months prior to any CVI.
4. International vaulters, their parents, coaches, lungers, horse owners and attendants should ensure that they have read the FEI Rules in full before submitting entries.

Article 60 Qualification - Individual, Pas de Deux CVI*, CVIJ*, CVI CH* & Squads

1. Scores to have been achieved in the current or previous 2 years.
2. BEV qualification criteria for CVI competitions not being held in the UK are:

3. There are no qualification scores required for 1* competitors at CVIs held in UK.

Article 61 Qualification for CVI**, CVIJ**, CVI CH**, CVI*** & CVIY**

1. All Competitors must fulfil the FEI score criteria – see FEI website.

Article 62 Qualification for Horses

1. Must be 7 years or older.
2. Must be sound and fit.
3. Must have a valid FEI Passport (valid for four years), to compete abroad.
4. Horses competing at an International Event within the UK do not need an FEI passport for CVI 1* and 2* but must have an FEI passport for CVI 3* and above. All horses at a CVI must have an FEI licence. Vaccination requirements as per FEI Rules must be adhered to.
5. Must have up to date vaccinations (within the last 6 months).
6. Horses must have achieved a score of 6.00, to compete abroad, this being the average Horse Score for Compulsories & Freestyle, in one BEV Competition in a class for which it is qualifying (Individual, Pas de Deux or Squad).

7. There is no qualifying horse score required to compete at a CVI in the UK. Lungers should ensure that the horse has sufficient training and experience.

CHAPTER XI BRITISH CHAMPIONSHIPS

Article 63 Vaulters Eligibility

1. BEV will publish annually, in good time and before the schedule is sent out, the qualifying criteria for the British Championships.

~~The top 15 vaulters in British Rankings can compete at the British Championships. Rankings for the British Championship are based on the best two ranking scores over the year.~~

~~Rankings will be available in male and female for 1*, 2*, 3* and in total (regardless of gender) for Pre-Novice and Novice.~~

2. To qualify for a title at the British Championship, a vaulter must hold a British passport and have competed at two National Competitions in the current season.

Article 64 Organising Committee for British Championships

- The British Championships shall be organised by the Management Committee.
- A Sub-Committee of at least four Members will be responsible for the organisation and will include the Technical Delegate and Secretary for the Event.

Article 65 Officials at British Championships

1. The following officials must be appointed, and this must be their only role:

- Technical Delegate see Clause 2.2.
- Secretary
- Chief Scorer
- Chief Steward

2. Other Officials Required:

- Timekeeper
- Writers – one for each Judge
- Music Technician
- Announcer
- Stewards
- Assistant Scorers

3. The Judges should be of the minimum level as follows:

2. The number of Individuals, Squads and Pas des Deux qualifying for Round 2 is at the discretion of the Organiser.
3. Vaulters may enter on one horse per class.
4. **H.C. entries will not be accepted.**

Article 67 Prize Giving and Awards

1. Trophies must be returned to the Competition Secretary before the start of the first class.
2. Prize Giving will be as soon after the end of the final class as is possible.
3. All Competitors should attend prize giving. Dispensation can be given by the Event Organiser or Technical Delegate in exceptional circumstances.
4. All Vaulters will receive a rosette.
5. To be awarded a title **and trophy** at the British Championships, a Vaulters, Pas de Deux or Squad must have competed in that class at a minimum of two National Competitions **in the current year.**
6. Trophies will be awarded to the first placed British Vaulters in each class.
7. The prize for the Best Squad Horse, Best Individual Horse and Best non-International Horse at the British Championships shall be the horse with the highest **final horse score with one competitor** at the Event. In the event of a tie, the first round free test score shall be the decider.

Article 68 Chef d'Equipe

1. Each Club will appoint a Chef d'Equipe.
2. The Chef d'Equipe is responsible for entries, declarations, collection of individual arm numbers, collection of score sheets, submitting music, collecting running orders, alterations/ changes on the day etc.
3. Only the Chef d'Equipe will be permitted to enter the show office.

Article 69 Volunteers

1. Each Club must provide volunteers when requested by the British Championships Organising Committee.

Walk Definition

Medium walk is a free and unconstrained walk. The horse should walk with energy and with calm, even and regular steps, distinctly marking four equally-spaced beats. The sequence of legs is left hind, left fore, right hind, right fore with no moment of suspension. The horse should keep a light and steady contact with the mouth.

Appendix B: Guidelines for Pre-Novice and Novice Compulsories

Compulsory Test Pre-Novice (PN) (Rein of Your Choice)

- Basic Seat (Arms by sides, palms in, fingers straight)
- Bench
- Leg to middle and back in rhythm of four canter strides (Dismount is not scored)

Basic Seat

Essence:

Harmony with the Horse Seat, Balance and Posture

Mechanics:

The Vaultler sits astride, erect and centred directly behind the surcingle, with legs down and in contact with the Horse, forming a straight vertical line through the shoulder, hip and heel. In order to achieve balance, the Vaultler must sit correctly without gripping or contracting his muscles. His back should remain supple and relaxed, so it can adequately absorb the Horse's movement. Arms as described.

Deductions:

Up to 1 point • Raised shoulders 1 point • For each stride less than four; strides are not counted before the exercise is set up or displayed (Letter C)

2 points • Retaking the handles once (Letter R)

Bench

Essence:

Harmony with the Horse & Balance

Mechanics:

From seat astride, the Vaultler comes to kneel, with both legs simultaneously, landing with the legs on the Horse's back. The lower leg remains in permanent contact with the Horse's back, and the weight is spread evenly from knee to toe. The vaultler maintains a flat back, which shoulders over hands and hips over knees. Head remains up facing forward.

Deductions:

1 point • Each stride less than four; (Letter C) • Making contact with the Horse's neck with any part of the body, (Letter N)

Up to 2 points • Lower legs not entirely in contact with the Horse (knee to toes). • Shoulders are significantly higher than the hips

2 points • Hands not on top of the handle • Retaking the handles once (Letter R) • Repeating the bench (e.g. trot)

Leg to middle and back in rhythm of four canter strides (Dismount is not scored)

Essence:

Harmony with the Horse Seat, Posture, Suppleness, Scope and Timing

Mechanics:

Leg to middle is a training exercise towards full mill. It is an exercise in which the Vaultler never abandons the seat position in either phase.

Each leg, starting with the outside leg, is stretched and carried over the Horse in a high, wide arc to the centre of the surcingle. The opposite leg remains stationary, down and in contact with the Horse. The upper body stays erect, centred, and nearly vertical in both phases. The leg then returns back down by the horse's side. The timing is up to the centre in 2 strides, down to side in 2 more. Allowing for a smooth movement up and down in total for 4 strides. The same then with the inside leg without pausing. The exercise is finished with the outside leg over to inside and simple dismount to the inside. This last part is not scored.

Deductions:

1 point • Each rhythm failure in the leg movement (Letter T)

Up to 2 points • seat incorrect • Buttocks leaving the Horse when lifting leg • Resting leg unstable • Insufficient elevation of the raised leg (the average of both leg phases)

Compulsory Test Novice (N) (Rein of Your Choice)

- Basic Seat
- Flag Leg Only
- Free Kneel
- Leg Changes

Basic Seat*Essence:*

Harmony with the Horse Seat, Balance and Posture

Mechanics:

As described in FEI guidelines

Flag Leg Only*Essence:*

Harmony with the Horse, Balance and Suppleness (particularly shoulder, hip)

Mechanics:

As described in the FEI guidelines. Flag without arm

Free Kneel:

Essence: Harmony with the Horse, Balance and Posture

The essence of the free kneel is the ability to maintain the balance in an unstable equilibrium on the Horse.

Mechanics:

From seat astride, the Vaultler comes softly to kneel simultaneously with both legs. The lower legs lie flat on the pad, parallel with the horse's spine, hip width apart. The toes are stretched. The Vaultler's weight is evenly spread from knees to toes. The handles are simultaneously released as the Vaultler rises into a free kneeling position, forming a vertical line through the shoulder and hip. The shoulders are parallel to the shoulder line of the Horse. The canter movement is absorbed through the legs and the upper body. The arms are extended straight down by vaultler's side. Upon completion of the static position, the arms are lowered towards the handles which the Vaultler takes simultaneously with both hands. Head remains up, looking forward, while the Vaultler slides smoothly with straight legs into an astride position.

Deductions:

Up to 1 point Lower legs not parallel with the Horse's spine • Lower legs wider than hips • Slow build up

1 point For each stride less than four, strides are not counted before the exercise is set up or displayed (Letter C)

Up to 2 points For distributing the weight unevenly between knees and toes

2 points Retaking the handles once (Letter R) Repeating the exercise (e.g. trot)

Leg Changes in rhythm of four canter strides with simple dismount to the inside*Essence:*

Harmony with the Horse Seat, Posture, Suppleness, Scope and Timing

Mechanics:

Leg changes is a training exercise towards full Mill. It is an exercise in which the Vaultler never abandons the seat position in either phase.

Each leg (phase) **starting with the outside leg**, is stretched and carried over the Horse in a high, wide arc over the surcingle (like a semi-circle). The resting leg remains stationary,

down and in contact with the Horse. The upper body stays erect, centred, and nearly vertical in all phases. The timing is 4 strides for each leg arc. Phase 1 ends with the Vaulters sitting in a sideways seat inside position, facing at a right angle to the shoulder axis, legs together and in contact with the Horse. The leg then returns to seat astride, then same then with the inside leg without pausing. The exercise is finished with the outside leg over to inside and simple dismount. Each leg arc is performed in a four-stride count.

Deductions:

1 point • Each rhythm failure in the leg movement (Letter T)

Up to 2 points • Seat incorrect • Buttocks leaving the Horse when lifting leg • Resting leg unstable • Insufficient elevation of the raised leg (the average of both leg phases)
